Kommentar

The 1930s have been a time of immense economic, political, and social turmoil. President Franklin D. Roosevelt's *New Deal* program of economic recovery and social reform implemented a policy to fight rising unemployment rates and poverty lines. His famous *fireside chats* on the radio were part of a newly developed media use which created a new era of "sight and sound" (Susman). The popular format of the photo-essay in such magazines as *Life* and *Look* fostered a particular visual documentation of the Thirties: one in which pho-

tographers of the renowned Farm Security Administration (FSA) captured the migrant workers, tenant farmers, and small towns of US-America.

In this seminar, students will explore the specific symbolisms, myths, and media visions of 1930s America. We will study literary texts by John Steinbeck and James Agee; plays by Clifford Odets; and photographic works by Walker Evans, Margaret Bourke-White, and Dorothea Lange to discuss the socio-historic context of the Great Depression, as well as issues of tradition, cultural memory, and mass culture of the 1930s.

Kommentar

"I'm a cowboy, on a steel horse I ride, I'm wanted dead or alive." When Jon Bon Jovi sang these lyrics in his song *Dead or Alive*, the bandleader relied on the well-established image of the American cowboy who, as a loner, fights for freedom and justice against all odds (and enemies) in the Wild West. Similarly, many other popular representations (in film, advertisements, fiction, and music) evoke the same spirit and imagery. Of all American regions, the West was and remains the most intensely (and stereotypically) mythologized. It has produced such national archetypes as the cowboy, the loner, or the trapper - a strong, virile man, for the most part, who is out in the West to find a space remote from an alleged over-civilization in the east, to conquer a "virgin land" (from native Americans) - and the heart of a woman who looks up to him as her truly masculine hero. Thus, the West was (and still is) envisaged as *the* epitome of American manhood and national identity.

In this class we will be concerned with the question of how the West was/is defined and redefined, reinforced, and challenged in literary, cultural, and filmic representations, and we shall read these texts against the backdrop of historical events. Our analysis and discussion will take as a major reference point Owen Wister's *The Virginian* (1902), a novel which in many ways set the tone for the genre of Westerns in the years to come, Frederic Remington's paintings, and Theodore Roosevelt's contemplations on the "strenuous life" out in the West. However, 'marginalized' voices, i.e., of women and Native Americans, will also be focused on, for example, in excerpts from Caroline Kirkland's frontier novel *A New Home. Who'll Follow?* (1839) or from Sherman Alexie's short story collection *The Lone Ranger and Tonto Fistfight in Heaven* (1993). We will also discuss Westerns in this class, and analyze true classics of the genre (*High Noon* (1952)), as well as recent (and subversive) representations in order to come to terms with the concepts and (mal)functions of the very image and stereotype of the West.

The texts will be made available in a reader at the beginning of the semester, but you are asked to purchase Owen Wister's *The Virginian* before the class starts.

Starting with the tales of Edgar Allan Poe and his programmatic essay "The Philosophy of Composition" (1846), this class will retrace the history and poetics of the American short story from the 19th century to the present day. We will read - among others - stories by Mark Twain, Charlotte Perkins Gilman, Kate Chopin, Ernest Hemingway, William Faulkner, Truman Capote, Raymond Carver, Miranda July, and David Foster Wallace.

Kommentar This course will explore how contemporary literature represents the digital revolution in communication and publishing, paying particular attention to figures of the book and bookishness in fantasies of the near future. We will read Jennifer Egan's *A Visit from the Goon Squad* and her twitter-novel *Black Box*, Rivka Galchen's *Atmospheric Disturbances*, Gary Shteyngart's *Super Sad True Love Story*, among others. As background we will read William Gibson's *Neuromancer*, and we might have time to explore Dave Eggers's recent novel *The Circle*. Theorists will range from Leslie Fiedler and Marshall McLuhan to Friedrich Kittler and beyond. We will also discuss new forms, such as crowd-funded literature or commercial literature based on consumer algorithms, and we may also explore digital poetry such as Flarf.

Kommentar This is the second in a series of four lecture courses devoted to exploring the cultural history of American literature. It is designed to provide an overview of U.S.-American literary and cultural history, beginning roughly with the burning of the *U.S.S. Philadelphia* in Tripoli Harbor in 1804 and ending with the explosion of the *U.S.S. Maine* in Havana Harbor in 1898. As these framing examples suggest, the course will approach American literature and culture from an international perspective, considering both its relation overseas engagements and continental expansion, but also, more generally, American culture as part of part of the process of transnational dialogue and exchange that led to the modern era. As Emily Dickinson put it, "There is no frigate like a book." We will consider sentimentalism, Transcendentalism, and the various authors of the American Renaissance. We will read poetry in various forms, and also trace the development of various narrative genres and modes, placing romance, realism, regionalism, and naturalism in their historical context. We will consider painting, architecture, and popular culture, the emergence of photography, and their connection to major domestic crises such as the Civil War. We will also consider political movements such as abolitionism and the slave narrative as a foundational American genre. The aim of the lectures is to chart the cultural course of a new nation expanding geographically, financially, and politically, from the first hesitant attempts to consolidate the gains of the Revolutionary War to the self-confident maneuvering of a global player on the threshold of the "American century."

Kommentar

In this course we will consider literary texts, films, and theories that focus on the nonhuman—animals, aliens, robots, digital devices, inanimate objects, natural stuff, media networks, oceanic currents, and other nonhuman "life forms." We will study fictions and essays that challenge the prevalent anthropocentrism of our culture—the idea that all that matters revolves around human productivity, exchange, and communication. Examining prose fiction, poetry, philosophy, and movies, we will ask how these texts allow us to think beyond a world that is defined primarily in human terms and how we can account for the agency and powers of the nonhuman— robotic intelligence and canine empathy; the vibrancy of electronic sheep, poison ivy, and nuclear waste; the activity of stones and drones; the communication of tigers, clownfish, and pigeons—. We explore the ways in which animals, artifacts, and androids come to figure vis-à-vis the human—how they reflect, oppose, challenge, and redefine what it means to be (non)human. Finally, we will consider how the focus on the nonhuman opens up a new angle on the coexistence of different species and life forms on our planet in the Anthropocene.

Readings include prose and poetry by Margaret Atwood, Ted Chiang, Emily Dickinson, Louise Erdrich, Philip K. Dick, Jonathan Safran Foer, Rivka Galchen, and Yann Martel, as well as essays and theory by Jane Bennett, Ian Bogost, Rosi Braidotti, Bill Brown, Donna Haraway, Katherine Hayles, and/or Bruno Latour. A syllabus with the final selection of readings will be provided in the first class meeting.

Kommentar "French habits and manners have their roots in a civilization so profoundly unlike ours - so much older, richer, more elaborate and firmly crystallized - that French customs necessarily differ from ours more than those of more primitive races." This is what Edith Wharton wrote in *French Ways and their Meaning* about the fascination of the hexagon on Americans. Wharton, of course, was not the first or only American writer to be engaged in this 'dangerous liaison,' i.e., America's perennial love-hate relation with France. What former U.S. Secretary of Defence, Donald Rumsfeld, scornfully dubbed part of 'Old Europe' in 2003 has in fact fascinated American literary and cultural history from the birth of the American nation onwards. Thomas Jefferson's years as American ambassador in Paris are notorious and legendary; Henry James's occupation with the international theme and his interest in European characters and settings is a cornerstone of his oeuvre. In the 20th century, France and Paris in particular gained increasing importance in the American mind when the so-called Lost Generation (expatriate writers and artists like Ernest Hemingway, Gertrude Stein, Josephine Baker, H.D., and F. Scott Fitzgerald, to name just a few) found refuge there. Ever since then, the French *savoir vivre* has lived on in literary, cultural, and filmic representations by Americans. Thus, it is certainly no coincidence that *Friends'* Rachel Green is on the verge of leaving for France at the end of the series, or that a certain Miss Carrie Bradshaw finds herself in Parisian exile in the last episodes of *Sex and the City*.

In this class we will be concerned with the literary and cultural connection between America and France, and investigate the development of a relationship that can by no means be limited to love stories. We will trace the early period (e.g., Jefferson's years in Paris, Alexis de Tocqueville's contemplations on the two nations) and read excerpts from Edith Wharton's *French Ways and Their Meaning* (1919) as well as Henry James's novel *The American* (1877) to set the groundwork for representations of the (later) 20th century. Selected writings of the Lost Generation and their depiction of Franco-American relations will be covered; moreover, filmic representations will be analyzed. Time and again, love, deception, cultural misunderstandings and stereotypes, as well as questions of morality and vice have been at the center of these representations. In his novel *Giovanni's Room* (1956) James Baldwin, too, makes use of the transatlantic love plot - however, in a subversive way. We will read this text as an alternative to the well-established 'boy-meets-girl' pattern.

Please purchase Henry James's *The American* and James Baldwin's *Giovanni's Room*. Other texts (mostly excerpts of primary and secondary literature) to be read in class will be made available in a reader (PDF files uploaded to Stud.IP) at the beginning of the seminar. Further secondary literature will be provided on my reserve shelf in the SUB.

Kommentar

In this course we will consider literary texts, films, and theories that focus on the nonhuman—animals, aliens, robots, digital devices, inanimate objects, natural stuff, media networks, oceanic currents, and other nonhuman "life forms." We will study fictions and essays that challenge the prevalent anthropocentrism of our culture—the idea that all that matters revolves around human productivity, exchange, and communication. Examining prose fiction, poetry, philosophy, and movies, we will ask how these texts allow us to think beyond a world that is defined primarily in human terms and how we can account for the agency and powers of the nonhuman—robotic intelligence and canine empathy; the vibrancy of electronic sheep, poison ivy, and nuclear waste; the activity of stones and drones; the communication of tigers, clownfish, and pigeons—. We explore the ways in which animals, artifacts, and androids come to figure vis-à-vis the human—how they reflect, oppose, challenge, and redefine what it means to be (non)human. Finally, we will consider how the focus on the nonhuman opens up a new angle on the coexistence of different species and life forms on our planet in the Anthropocene.

Readings include prose and poetry by Margaret Atwood, Ted Chiang, Emily Dickinson, Louise Erdrich, Philip K. Dick, Jonathan Safran Foer, Rivka Galchen, and Yann Martel, as well as essays and theory by Jane Bennett, Ian Bogost, Rosi Braidotti, Bill Brown, Donna Haraway, Katherine Hayles, and/or Bruno Latour. A syllabus with the final selection of readings will be provided in the first class meeting.

Kommentar "I'm a cowboy, on a steel horse I ride, I'm wanted dead or alive." When Jon Bon Jovi sang these lyrics in his song *Dead or Alive*, the bandleader relied on the well-established image of the American cowboy who, as a loner, fights for freedom and justice against all odds (and enemies) in the Wild West. Similarly, many other popular representations (in film, advertisements, fiction, and music) evoke the same spirit and imagery. Of all American regions, the West was and remains the most intensely (and stereotypically) mythologized. It has produced such national archetypes as the cowboy, the loner, or the trapper - a strong, virile man, for the most part, who is out in the West to find a space remote from an alleged over-civilization in the east, to conquer a "virgin land" (from native Americans) - and the heart of a woman who looks up to him as her truly masculine hero. Thus, the West was (and still is) envisaged as *the* epitome of American manhood and national identity.

In this class we will be concerned with the question of how the West was/is defined and redefined, reinforced, and challenged in literary, cultural, and filmic representations, and we shall read these texts against the backdrop of historical events. Our analysis and discussion will take as a major reference point Owen Wister's *The Virginian* (1902), a novel which in many ways set the tone for the genre of Westerns in the years to come, Frederic Remington's paintings, and Theodore Roosevelt's contemplations on the "strenuous life" out in the West. However, 'marginalized' voices, i.e., of women and Native Americans, will also be focused on, for example, in excerpts from Caroline Kirkland's frontier novel *A New Home. Who'll Follow?* (1839) or from Sherman Alexie's short story collection *The Lone Ranger and Tonto Fistfight in Heaven* (1993). We will also discuss Westerns in this class, and analyze true classics of the genre (*High Noon* (1952)), as well as recent (and subversive) representations in order to come to terms with the concepts and (mal)functions of the very image and stereotype of the West.

The texts will be made available in a reader at the beginning of the semester, but you are asked to purchase Owen Wister's *The Virginian* before the class starts.

We will also discuss new forms, such as crowd-funded literature or commercial literature based on consumer algorithms, and we may also explore digital poetry such as Flarf.

Kommentar

The 1930s have been a time of immense economic, political, and social turmoil. President Franklin D. Roosevelt's *New Deal* program of economic recovery and social reform implemented a policy to fight rising unemployment rates and poverty lines. His famous *fireside chats* on the radio were part of a newly developed media use which created a new era of "sight and sound" (Susman). The popular format of the photo-essay in such magazines as *Life* and *Look* fostered a particular visual documentation of the Thirties: one in which photographers of the renowned Farm Security Administration (FSA) captured the migrant workers, tenant farmers, and small towns of US-America.

In this seminar, students will explore the specific symbolisms, myths, and media visions of 1930s America. We will study literary texts by John Steinbeck and James Agee; plays by Clifford Odets; and photographic works by Walker Evans, Margaret Bourke-White, and Dorothea Lange to discuss the socio-historic context of the Great Depression, as well as issues of tradition, cultural memory, and mass culture of the 1930s.

Kommentar

Our understanding of the history of American cinema is largely shaped by narrative film, usually epitomized by "Hollywood" and its generic formulas. But there has always been an "other tradition" of filmmaking in the United States questioning this common notion. Kommentar

"French habits and manners have their roots in a civilization so profoundly unlike ours - so much older, richer, more elaborate and firmly crystallized - that French customs necessarily differ from ours more than those of more primitive races." This is what Edith Wharton wrote in *French Ways and their Meaning* about the fascination of the hexagon on Americans. Wharton, of course, was not the first or only American writer to be engaged in this 'dangerous liaison,' i.e., America's perennial love-hate relation with France. What former U.S. Secretary of Defence, Donald Rumsfeld, scornfully dubbed part of 'Old Europe' in 2003 has in fact fascinated American literary and cultural history from the birth of the American nation onwards. Thomas Jefferson's years as American ambassador in Paris are notorious and legendary; Henry James's occupation with the international theme and his interest in European characters and settings is a cornerstone of his oeuvre. In the 20th century, France and Paris in particular gained increasing importance in the American mind when the so-called Lost Generation (expatriate writers and artists like Ernest Hemingway, Gertrude Stein, Josephine Baker, H.D., and F. Scott Fitzgerald, to name just a few) found refuge there. Ever since then, the French *savoir vivre* has lived on in literary, cultural, and filmic representations by Americans. Thus, it is certainly no coincidence that *Friends'* Rachel Green is on the verge of leaving for France at the end of the series, or that a certain Miss Carrie Bradshaw finds herself in Parisian exile in the last episodes of *Sex and the City*.

In this class we will be concerned with the literary and cultural connection between America and France, and investigate the development of a relationship that can by no means be limited to love stories. We will trace the early period (e.g., Jefferson's years in Paris, Alexis de Tocqueville's contemplations on the two nations) and read excerpts from Edith Wharton's *French Ways and Their Meaning* (1919) as well as Henry James's novel *The American* (1877) to set the groundwork for representations of the (later) 20th century. Selected writings of the Lost Generation and their depiction of Franco-American relations will be covered; moreover, filmic representations will be analyzed. Time and again, love, deception, cultural misunderstandings and stereotypes, as well as questions of morality and vice have been at the center of these representations. In his novel *Giovanni's Room* (1956) James Baldwin, too, makes use of the transatlantic love plot - however, in a subversive way. We will read this text as an alternative to the well-established 'boy-meets-girl' pattern.

Kommentar

Today the term "sentimental," if it is used at all, is used largely as a term of disparagement. Sentimental literature is supposed to be emotionally self-indulgent; this is a gendered critique since it is often assumed to be written by or for women. In the eighteenth and early nineteenth-centuries, however, "sentiment" and cognates such as "sympathy" and "sensibility" and "feeling" referred to a positive emotional capacity. Philosophers argued that this emotional capacity made human beings more benevolent than had previously been thought, and they held up sentimentalism as a counterargument to the Hobbesian notion of natural human selfishness and the Calvinist notion of innate depravity after the Fall. Sentimentalism also came to describe a style of writing closely connected with the rise of the novel. Indeed, what was arguably the first American novel, Brown's *Power of Sympathy*, is an example of sentimentalism, as were the earliest American bestsellers ranging from *Charlotte Temple* to *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. This course will be devoted to close-readings of these somewhat neglected novels. We will also dip into Adam Smith for an account of moral sentiments, and to explore the relation of sentimentalism to the free-trade capitalism he seemed to advocate in *The Wealth of Nations*. We will also discuss the gender politics of reading, writing, and disparaging sentimentalism, and consider some of the resonances between eighteenth- and nineteenth-century sentimentalism and the recent return to affect in, for instance, trauma theory.

Kommentar

In this course we will consider literary texts, films, and theories that focus on the nonhuman—animals, aliens, robots, digital devices, inanimate objects, natural stuff, media networks, oceanic currents, and other nonhuman "life forms." We will study fictions and essays that challenge the prevalent anthropocentrism of our culture—the idea that all that matters revolves around human productivity, exchange, and communication. Examining prose fiction, poetry, philosophy, and movies, we will ask how these texts allow us to think beyond a world that is defined primarily in human terms and how we can account for the agency and powers of the nonhuman—robotic intelligence and canine empathy; the vibrancy of electronic sheep, poison ivy, and nuclear waste; the activity of stones and drones; the communication of tigers, clownfish, and pigeons—. We explore the ways in which animals, artifacts, and androids come to figure vis-à-vis the human—how they reflect, oppose, challenge, and redefine what it means to be (non)human. Finally, we will consider how the focus on the nonhuman opens up a new angle on the coexistence of different species and life forms on our planet in the Anthropocene.

Readings include prose and poetry by Margaret Atwood, Ted Chiang, Emily Dickinson, Louise Erdrich, Philip K. Dick, Jonathan Safran Foer, Rivka Galchen, and Yann Martel, as well as essays and theory by Jane Bennett, Ian Bogost, Rosi Braidotti, Bill Brown, Donna Haraway, Katherine Hayles, and/or Bruno Latour. A syllabus with the final selection of readings will be provided in the first class meeting.
